The Counties of Galveston and Brazoria jointly agreed in 1969 to the establishment of the Gulf Coast Center (originally known as Gulf Coast Regional Mental Health Mental Retardation Center). The Center is governed by a nine-member volunteer Board of Trustees appointed by the County Commissioner's Courts of Galveston (5 members) and Brazoria (4 members) Counties, Texas.

2/11/16	Plan submitted to the RPNAC for final review. As a result of the review by the RPNAC the following recommendations were made:		
	1. It was noted that all Centers reported that there were no private providers who expressed interest in contracting with LMHA's for non-Medicaid services. This seems to be a reflection on the rates that are reimbursed for these services.		
	2. There was discussion about Level of Care assessments at each center and a suggestion that a comparison of percentages of total clients in each level among centers would be useful in the future.		
	3. There was a suggestion that each Center who uses ETBHN as a provider for telemedicine and pharmacy include those in their plans so that it is uniformly included.
